# North Coast Itinerary: Astoria to Tillamook (Day 1-2)

# Day 1: Astoria & Fort Stevens State Park

Astoria: Explore the Historic Waterfront, Astoria Column, and Columbia River Maritime Museum

Astoria, Oregon, nestled at the mouth of the Columbia River, is a city rich in history and natural beauty. As the oldest American settlement west of the Rocky Mountains, it offers a unique blend of maritime heritage, Victorian architecture, and stunning Pacific Northwest landscapes.

**Astoria Column:** Perched high on Coxcomb Hill, the Astoria Column is a monumental tower offering panoramic views of the city, the Columbia River, and the Pacific Ocean. This 125-foot column, built in 1926, features a spiral fresco depicting significant events in Oregon's history. Visitors can climb the 164-step spiral staircase to the top for breathtaking vistas, making it an ideal spot for photography and soaking in the expansive scenery.



Historic Waterfront: Stroll along Astoria's vibrant waterfront, where historic cannery buildings have been repurposed into charming shops, restaurants, and art galleries. The Astoria Riverwalk, a paved path stretching for miles, offers a pleasant way to explore the area, with interpretive signs detailing the city's past. You might even catch a glimpse of sea lions basking on the docks or large ships navigating the Columbia River.

**Columbia River Maritime Museum:** Delve into the region's seafaring past at the Columbia

River Maritime Museum. This acclaimed museum showcases the rich history of the Columbia River and the Pacific Northwest, featuring engaging exhibits on fishing, shipbuilding, navigation, and the treacherous bar at the river's mouth. Highlights include a full-sized fishing vessel, a Coast Guard motor lifeboat, and interactive displays that bring maritime history to life.



Fort Stevens State Park: See the Peter Iredale Shipwreck and Miles of Beaches

Just a short drive from Astoria, Fort Stevens State Park offers a diverse range of attractions, from historical military batteries to expansive beaches and a famous shipwreck. This sprawling park, once a military defense installation, is now a haven for outdoor enthusiasts.

**Peter Iredale Shipwreck:** A must-see at Fort Stevens is the skeletal remains of the Peter Iredale, a four-masted steel barque that ran aground in 1906. The shipwreck, a hauntingly beautiful sight, is easily accessible at low tide and provides a dramatic backdrop for photos. The shifting sands and tides constantly reveal and conceal different parts of the wreck, making each visit unique.



**Miles of Beaches:** Fort Stevens boasts miles of pristine, sandy beaches, perfect for beachcombing, kite flying, or simply enjoying a leisurely stroll. The wide-open spaces offer a sense of tranquility and endless opportunities for recreation. Keep an eye out for diverse birdlife and, if you're lucky, you might spot some marine wildlife.

**Historic Military Area:** Explore the remnants of Fort Stevens, which served as a coastal defense installation from the Civil War through World War II. Visitors can wander through concrete bunkers, gun batteries, and learn about the fort's role in protecting the Oregon coast. The historical exhibits provide a fascinating glimpse into military life and the strategic importance of the area.

# Day 2: Seaside, Cannon Beach & Tillamook

# Seaside & Cannon Beach: Walk the Promenade, Photograph Iconic Haystack Rock

Continuing south along the Oregon Coast, Seaside and Cannon Beach offer distinct yet equally captivating experiences, from classic beach town charm to iconic natural landmarks.

**Seaside Promenade:** Seaside is known for its historic Promenade, a 1.5-mile paved walkway stretching along the beachfront. Perfect for walking, jogging, or biking, the Prom offers stunning ocean views and access to the bustling town. You can find the famous Turnaround at the end of Broadway, marking the end of the Lewis and Clark

Trail. The town itself offers a variety of shops, arcades, and eateries, making it a lively stop.



**Cannon Beach & Haystack Rock:** Just a few miles south of Seaside lies Cannon Beach, home to the iconic Haystack Rock. This magnificent 235-foot sea stack is one of Oregon's most recognizable landmarks and a designated marine garden and wildlife refuge. At low tide, visitors can walk out to the rock to explore tide pools teeming with marine life and observe nesting seabirds, including puffins during certain seasons. The beach itself is wide and sandy, ideal for leisurely strolls and photography.



**Ecola State Park: Hike Through Old-Growth Forests to Stunning Viewpoints** 

Nestled between Seaside and Cannon Beach, Ecola State Park offers breathtaking coastal vistas, lush old-growth forests, and access to secluded beaches. It's a

perfect spot for nature lovers and hikers.

**Scenic Viewpoints:** The park features several stunning viewpoints, including the main Ecola Point viewpoint, which offers panoramic views of the coastline, Haystack Rock, and the Tillamook Rock Lighthouse offshore. Indian Beach, a popular surfing spot, is also accessible within the park and provides a more secluded beach experience.



**Hiking Trails:** Ecola State Park is crisscrossed with a network of hiking trails that wind through ancient Sitka spruce forests and offer glimpses of hidden coves and dramatic cliffs. The Clatsop Loop Trail, part of the Oregon Coast Trail, provides a moderate hike with rewarding views.

# Tillamook: Tour the Famous Creamery and Explore the Three Capes Scenic Route

**Tillamook Creamery:** No visit to Tillamook is complete without a stop at the Tillamook Creamery. **Three Capes Scenic Route:** Just west of Tillamook, the Three Capes Scenic Route is a spectacular drive that winds along the coastline, connecting Cape Meares, Cape Lookout, and Cape Kiwanda. This route offers dramatic cliffside views, secluded beaches, and opportunities for wildlife viewing, including migrating whales during certain times of the year. Each cape offers unique geological formations and stunning photographic opportunities.

# **Planning Your North Coast Journey**

### **Best Time to Visit the Oregon North Coast**

The Oregon Coast experiences a temperate climate, but weather can vary significantly by season. While beautiful year-round, here's a general guide to help you plan your visit:

**Summer (June - August):** This is the most popular time to visit, offering the warmest temperatures, least rainfall, and longest daylight hours. Ideal for beach activities, hiking, and exploring. However, it's also the busiest and most expensive season, so book accommodations well in advance.

**Fall (September - November):** Often considered a 'secret season,' fall brings fewer crowds, pleasant temperatures, and stunning clear days, especially in early fall.

The ocean can still be warm enough for some activities, and storm watching begins later in the season.

- **Winter (December February):** This is prime storm-watching season, with dramatic waves and powerful winds. While colder and wetter, it offers a unique, rugged beauty. Many accommodations offer off-season rates. Be prepared for rain and wind.
- **Spring (March May):** Spring sees the return of wildflowers, migrating whales, and gradually improving weather. It's a good time to visit for fewer crowds than summer and more moderate temperatures than winter, though rain is still common.

Regardless of the season, always pack layers, as coastal weather can change rapidly.

# **Transportation Tips**

The most flexible way to explore the Oregon North Coast is by car, allowing you to stop at viewpoints, trailheads, and small towns at your leisure. Highway 101 is the main scenic route that parallels the coastline.

**Driving:** Renting a car is highly recommended for maximum flexibility. Be aware that cell service can be spotty in some areas, so download offline maps. •

**Public Transportation:** While less comprehensive than driving, public bus transportation is available along the Oregon Coast. The North Coast Express offers weekend shuttle services from Portland to destinations like Astoria, Seaside, and Cannon Beach, providing a car-free option for some visitors. Check schedules and routes in advance if relying on public transport.

- **Sneaker Waves:** These are unexpectedly large waves that can surge much farther up the beach than others, pulling unsuspecting visitors into the ocean. Always keep an eye on the ocean, even when far from the water's edge.
- **Tides and Rip Currents:** Be aware of tide schedules, especially when exploring tide pools or walking near sea stacks. Rip currents can be strong and dangerous; if caught in one, swim parallel to the shore until you are out of the current, then swim to shore.
- **Driftwood and Logs:** Large logs and driftwood can be unstable and dangerous, especially when wet or near the water. Never climb on or near them. •

**Cliffs and Rocks:** Stay on marked trails and away from cliff edges, as they can be unstable and prone to crumbling. Rocks can be slippery, so wear appropriate footwear.

Hypothermia: The ocean water is cold year-round. If you plan to swim or engage in

water sports, wear a wetsuit. Even on sunny days, wind chill can lead to hypothermia.

Wildlife: Observe wildlife from a distance. Do not approach or feed animals.

## **Things to Bring**

**Waterproof Rain Jacket:** Essential for unexpected showers and wind. •

**Binoculars:** For whale watching and birding. •

**Camera:** To capture the stunning scenery.

**Reusable Water Bottle:** Stay hydrated and reduce waste. •

**Snacks:** Especially for hikes or long drives.

**Beach Towel:** For relaxing on the sand.

**Small Backpack:** For day trips and carrying essentials.
